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
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THE NUMBER OF THE BEAST

Hey Fuckers! This is your Uncle Anus in Toronto for Absolute Underground magazine! I'm here with the legendary Warren Hastings, AKA Spider, that lovable old fart of a punk that throws those awesome Punkfest parties that you have all heard about. I met Spider back in 1991 at one of his first Birthday Parties, at Spiderland Acres, and have partied and played music at these 'Punkfests' ever since. He is one of the most eccentric (and one of the loudest!) people I know.

You were living in England during the early years of Punk. How did you get into it?

Well, I was a sort of a 'disco soul boy' and I was hiring myself out for gigs as a DJ when I was accidentally hired by the Sex Pistols, who were doing a show at the Tropicana, in Soho. They were trying to get a recording contract and just wanted to run the disco music up until their set because they had all the 'bigwigs' there and all, ya know? So that's how I fell into

What were some of your favorite bands and clubs from that time in England?

There would be like five bands a night playing the Roxy. I saw all the early bands from Souxie and the UK Subs. It was just an explosion, it was happening so fast. I'm glad I was in the whirlwind of it. Let's talk about your party, the legendary Punkfest. Although many people only know it as 'The Heaviest Show In The Universel'... it is actually a celebration of your birthday is it not? Correct, Yeah.



And this year is your 70th?

What do you think punkrock is all about? Punkrock is ANTI-EVERYTHING! I see you still like to smoke pot!

It's God's healing herb.

How does a sexy crazy-man like yourself stay single all these years?!

Because it keeps me fresh! I can move from nest to nest! And I am not stuck to any one. I find being in a relationship is a lot like doing prison time. I would rather be free, and if they don't boogie? TOUGH

The first party I was at was in 1990 or 91. It was on the back porch of your first house. Was that the first official Punkfest?

Yeah, '91. That was my first house. I built a stage off. the back. I remember there was a carnival, complete with rides, games, and refreshments. The UK Subs came from England just to play that one show. What happened to that old house?

Someone set fire to it. The way the police told me:

it was this woman, she supposedly has 'The Biggest Tits In Ontario' (Nice!) She had a little weasel of a husband who she was trying to make jealous. It worked he came over and burned my house down.

Is this because you have also had an ongoing feud with Marmora City Counsel over your parties?

Well, they have injunctions against me having any parties on my land any more. And it costs a lot of money to fight the injunctions and overturn them. I went as far as about 9,000 and then I gave up. It just wasn't worth it, and so I bought my new property.

I remember 1994 saw 60 bands representing 4 countries play that stage. There were about 3000 punks from all over North America and beyond. Is Punkfest your only party?

I'm going with four parties a year now. I'll see how this summer at my new place goes. So the next one is the Annual Punkfest, July 14-16, your 70th birthday party.

Right. And then there is the Labour Day weekend party, as well as the Canadian Thanksgiving, but we'll let the Americans come anyways!

Do you have any last 'guru' advice from a crazy 'old bat' like yourself or is there anything else you'd like to say before we go burn one?

Just to come out to party with me and be yourself. Check out the Punkfest song by Joey Only from Vancouver! (www.joeyonly.com/downloads.html) It's a wacky song, but I like it!

Well, Punkfest is also gaining momentum and needs to be known around the world! We'd like to see everybody come out and have fun and invite punks from everywhere to come out and celebrate Spider's 70th and party at PUNKFEST!

The Horde of Anachron was conjured in late October circa 2005. After more then a few incarnations and line-up changes the horde was solidified. David Mayo (former Pariah), Aaron Berg (former Hunting Humans) and Chadwick Klassen (former Allfather). After some time of searching the wasteland for musicians of high skill the H.O.A. has finally acquired a second guitar player, Matt Barker, formerly also of Hunting Humans. To combine and form the machinations of this devastating juggernaut. The Horde of Anachron sound can best be described as an exploratory approach to the various styles of underground metal, encompassing both lyrical harmony and musical technicality using a blackened thrash/deathmetal influence. With a self titled five song promo/demo cd release which has received much exaltation they are once again in the writing/recording phase; furthering their metalige and preparing for total conquest!

Who's in the band?

The horde part of the name would suggest there are more than one of us who are "out of time or place", in other words, we are not as we seem. The H.O.A is displaced in time and we feel that we belong to another age. An age of supreme imperial conquest!

What other bands has everyone been in?

Primordial aka Warscreams Impaler used to be in Allfather. Berg and Beef used to be in Hunting Humans. Necrodonis was in Pariah. These were all our most recent previous endeavors.

Who are some of your inspirations musically?

We all take influence from a wide assortment of musicians. A few for us are into Carcass, Absu, Emperor, Cannibal Corpse and Kreator. Those are just a few of the metal ones. 








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INDERGREND TAREHOUS

The now legendary (and originally Canadian) Stern Brothers (Shawn, Mark, and Adam) started out playing music in LA around 1980 and have maintained a strict DIY punk rock mentality ever since.

Youth Brigade's early exploits included a tour with Social Distortion that is well documented in the punk travel film "Another State of Mind". Shawn and Mark formed the Better Youth Organization in 1982 and also BYO Records, which has a very solid reputation for uncompromising. Bands associated with the label include The Unseen, A Global Threat, The Briefs, Clit 45, and Manic Hispanic.

Youth Brigade was my favorite band from the first chord they struck when I caught them live at the Limit 10

years ago. The first song they played was "Violence" and it was the most intense opening song I've ever seen a punk band play. It was a show I'll never forget and they left me seriously wanting more.

I got the chance a few years ago as Youth Brigade went on the road with the Swingin' Utters. It was a deadly show but the dicks at Richards on Richards made Youth Brigade cut their set short so the bar stars could listen to shitty techno and snort cocaine.

After attending BYO's Punk Rock Bowling Tournament in Vegas, I got hooked up with the lovely Julie at BYO and arranged for the following interview.

AU: Hey Shawn did you like that punk rock bowling

Shawn Stern: Oh yeah, that was great!

SS: It's always interesting to read other peoples stories cause most of the time I have absolutely no idea that most of that even went on. That's how big it's gotten. Apparently somebody climbed up and put a hat on the bear, and got caught and thrown out.

${\it AU: How \ about \ them \ tilt \ wheel \ guys?}$

SS: Yeah, well them I'm always aware of, and actually this year they were a little extra obnoxious, especially because they caused a bunch of damage at the party to one of the monitors. I mean everyone gets drunk and does stupid shit, but if you are a musician you don't pour beer into monitors. How stupid is that?

AU: Ya, that's pretty stupid. Who came up with the idea for the Punk Rock Bowlina?

SS: Well what happened was Fat Wreck Chords had done this little league in San Fran with a few other labels up there. We did something like that down by calling up some other labels around LA. I think we had fifteen or twenty teams at the beginning, and everyone had a great time. Then my brother said we should do a tournament in Vegas, because he's always trying to figure out excuses to go to Vegas. We had 27 teams the first time and the last one we had 168 teams.

AU: I really enjoyed the River Boat Gamblers, the Briefs, and Manic Hispanic, but who are some of the other bands who have played at past tournaments?

SS: Well, Youth Brigade has played, NOFX has played a couple times, LagWagon, :Pistol Grip, Clit 45, the Forgotten, Throw Rag, Flogging Molly, Drop Kick Murphys, Voodoo Glow Skulls, and Swingin' Utters.

Do you remember playing Victoria at a club called The Limit? It was a

BYO tour with Four Letter Word and PinHead Circus?

SS: Oh yeah, yeah, that was fun. It was a much better show than the first time we went there in 1982 on the Someone Got Their Head Kicked In Tour.

AU: What was it like then?

SS: We stayed at the Dayglo Abortions house and it was a crazy party. But the show weird, Victoria's Punk Rock scene wasn't that huge so it was like a big empty hall with us and Social Distortion. Mostly it was just a drunken party. I mean, that was our first show in Canada and we kept telling Social Distortion, cause we are Canadians, I mean even though we left when we were young, we'd came back when we were teenagers and we knew how strong the beer was and we kept telling them, "The beer is gonna kick

a living playing your music it's kind of hard continuing making records, so the fact that kids are out there listening to this music, and bands are making money, then overall it's a good thing. But inevitably major record labels get involved and that always means watering down the music and the message and that's unfortunate. A lot of people think that punk rock is having tattoos and piercing yourself, a lot of the things about punk rock have been coopted by other people who try to claim it's punk rock but it's not. I mean, Emo music isn't punk rock, it has nothing to do with Punk Rock in my opinion, and the bands who are popular and who try to call themselves punk rock or who hint that they have some sort of association with punk rock as far as I'm concerned have nothing to do with Punk Rock. At least talk about things that matter to people. Like the fact the Government in America is

sending people to die in a war completely unnecessarily. The World is in a BIG BIG BIG mess right now not just because of war, but also the way we treat the environment. It's getting worse and if we don't deal with it soon, we aren't going to have a planet to live on very much longer.

AU: What is the motto of the Better Youth Oraanization, is it sort of a take action sort of a thina?

SS: Yeah, I think it's just about, and this is in general for me what I think punk rock should be about, or what it is to me, it's just you need to think for yourself, and you need to try and change what you think is wrong in the world and that's the message that we put forth through our music and we try to work with bands that believe the same sort of thing.

AU: is there a new Youth Brigade album in the works?

SS: Yeah we've been talking about an album for a while now, but I'm in the middle of doing crazy construction and have been pretty busy with the label. Soon I'll have a new recording studio in my house, and I can finally spend some time working on new songs.

AU: So you touched on that you used to smoke weed, do you still partake of the herbal extracts?

SS: Laughs... I can't really smoke weed anymore, it just freaks me out too much. But I like to drink still, I think everyone should be partying with whatever they like to party with. I think they should legalize drugs and the world would be a better place, we wouldn't have to waste of our time and money declaring war on drugs.

AU: Were doing another story about Slayer, what do you think of them?

SS: I'm not a fan of metal music at all, Slayer is not a bad band, they are kind of influenced by Punk Rock, but I'd just rather hear bands play punk rock. The bands in the 70's sort of started the beginning of heavy metal, but most heavy metal for me is just sort of the epitome of arena rock. That was what was left after the protest music of the 60's. The bands just got huge and it became this thing about making money, and all that was left was sex, drugs and rock and roll. I've got no problem with any of those things, but I just think that music can be more than just that. For me most metal bands are just about the party, and it's all style, no substance and they don't really have much to say, so I'll take punk rock any day over metal.



your ass," and they were like, "Beer, phhh, what's the big deal?" By the end of the night they were either passed out or puking in the bushes so it was guite amusing.

AU: Tell us how BYO records came about?

SS: It was just kind of a situation where we were in a band and we wanted to play shows so we put on our own shows and eventually we decided to make a record, and we weren't going to go to a major label to put it out and we just sort of did everything ourselves.

AU: So what were some of the bands you hooked up with right away?

SS: Well the first thing we released was a compilation, because we kinda realized that it made sense. The idea was to put a record out with a bunch of different bands. get a song or two from each of them bands and we can hopefully attract some attention. Social Distortion, Adolescence, Bad Religion, plus Youth Brigade's first material was on that as well. It sounded like a good idea and it worked really well, it got a lot of good reaction and we decided to put out a full Youth Brigade record, and we really liked Aggression so we put their record out. Then when we were on the road we met SNFU up in Edmonton and we decided to put a record out with them, we also met Seven Seconds on the road and we put a record out with them, and it just sort of grew from that. We put a second compilation out in 1984 called "Something To Believe In" which had 7 or 9 Canadian bands.

AU: What do you have to say about the current state of Punk Rock

SS: (Chuckles) Well, you know its much much bigger now than it ever was, which a lot of people bitch and moan about, but, you have to realize that living in a capitalist society we gotta deal with the reality that if you can't make

ACOUSTICHAOS INVADES LOGAN'S PUB

Mr. Plow was my introduction to the world of Acoustichaos. While I had been sitting on my ass here in Vic I'd missed out on the growing Acoustichaos scene that was brewing over in East Van out of the Cobalt. I soon made my way over for Anti-folk fest, a huge show at the Cobalt that featured almost a dozen acts of insane acoustic mayhem.

I've always been a sucker for an acoustic guitar, and this kind of music (also called folk-punk or anti-folk) combines humor (the dirtier the better in my opinion) with punk rock's D.I.Y. ethics

Finally, after much too long of a wait Acoustichaos was returning to Victoria. The stage was set and I was riding a wave of sleep deprivation. I almost missed the renowned Fat Joe Satan but luckily he had just got going and still had a few loudly belted, earnestly sung, perversely funny songs left. My favorite part of any Fat Joe Satan set is when he graces the audience with the old Vancouver's Shame song "My face, Your Ass."

Up next was Dan Scum. Whose improvisational style, where he seems to make the set up as he goes, is always disarming in its stripped down honesty. Drinking Scotch on stage, Dan who is the singer of the notorious PowerClown... evil clowns who rip through Iron Maiden cover songs like nobody's business, made his way through a multi-lingual set. He did an impressive rendition of one of murder metal band Macabre's songs about Jeffery Dahmer as well as a great satire of Jay LeBlanc, acoustichaos kingpin, as well as the next act.

Jay and Kytami followed. They offered a different style of Acoustichaos than the previous acts of the night. Kytami plays the violin beautifully and she




compliments Jay's frantic, driven and heavy acoustic guitar playing perfectly. I can remember the first time that I saw these two, I didn't know that acoustic guitar could be played that heavily. Jay was instrumental in the development of the Acoustichaos scene in Vancouver, hosting many open jam nights at the Cobalt which gave many of these acts like Fat Joe Satan, Johnny Sizzle, a stage to play on. Mr. Plow delivered his gruff and growly set of cleverly blended satire, social commentary and x-rated humor backed by catchy songs that make you wanna dance around like a little kid. He kept it short, leaving the audience wanting more as always. Plow played a few new songs as well as some Mr. Plow classics like the "Donkey Song" and my all time favourite "Golden Shower Girl."

The headliner that night was B.A. Johnston. This was the last night of B.A. and Mr. Plow's across Canada tour. This is a man who truly gives it his fucking all! He danced, sang, and played his was through a

monumentally impressive set and really blew me away. I can't remember the last time I saw someone give'r that hard. He sang a very beautiful song about having a deep-fryer in his bedroom, had multiple costumes, and a diverse repertoire of awesome synthesizer tracks to heighten the experience. He interacted with the crowd and climbed around on and off stage as well. He's got moves that you've never seen! 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Fuck the Black Halos, those bastards. While average citizens slaved at crummy jobs just to pay the bills, the Halos toured Europe for forty-nine days. While Joe Blow lifted boxes or stood on an assembly line, the Black Halos smoked hash in Amsterdam. While Plain Jane sold clothing or answered phones, the black-haired slackers got drunk with young, pretty girls in Germany. Life isn't fair and the Black Halos are a case in point. Obviously there is no God because if there was, the Halos would be suffering like the rest of us. Singer Billy Hopeless, for example, would make a dandy greeter at Wal-Mart.

Then again, it hasn't always been so easy for the Black Halos. Things haven't exactly been peaches and cream since they started as the Black Market Babies almost twelve years ago. Back then, they opened for underground heroes like the Insipids at local gigs such as Rock Against Sobriety, where they won the Drunkest Band of the Night award (more beer as a prize, I'm assuming). It wasn't all glamour for the Babies back then, and they dodged piles of puke and neighbourhood junkies walking home from the boozecan just like the rest of us. There was the slow rise up through the ranks while other bands floundered and quit. Just staying together was an accomplishment and when the Black Halos released their first album, it was a miracle unto itself. Most local acts, decimated by drug abuse, never even got that far. For a few years, the Black Halos burned brightly. Vancouver's favourite punk/glam/rock band were signed by Sub Pop for the superb and underappreciated The Violent Years, and even got radio play for the single Some Things Never Fall. They headlined gigs at the Commodore, playing with such notables as DOA, Flash Bastard, and the Spitfires. The Black Halos seemed indestructible and toured the world over to spread the word. Nothing could stop them.

Except each other, of course. On a long North Except each other, of course. On a long North American tour, the band imploded fatally. Touring is tough, and spending 24/7 broke in a smelly van has been the death of many a group. Guitarist Rich Jones joined Amen, bassist Matt Camirand started Blood Meridian, and guitarist Jay Millete joined the Spitfires. Billy started the Widows with Sioban Duvall, and drummer Rob Zallie, island later. Sup Pondrapad the Halor. Zgaljic joined later. Sub Pop dropped the Halos and it looked like the end. Then, from the ashes, the Black Halos rose again. They rallied together, and in 2003, lit the flame They rallied together, and in 2003, lit the flame for 6000 rabid fans in a Spanish circus tent. When the dust had settled, Adam Becvare had replaced Rich Jones on guitar, and youngblood Denyss McKnight took Matt Camirand's spot on bass. Billy, Jay, and Rob kept their old jobs, of course, and the band soldiered on. The resurrected Halos, it seemed, were stronger than every and the provisit they impendiately. than ever, and to prove it, they immediately embarked on yet another gruelling tour. In the fall of 2004, they signed with Liquor & Poker Records and in February '05, recorded the superlative Alive

Without Control. You can't keep a good band down.

In May of 2005, while supporting the new album in Cleveland, disaster struck again. Billy Hopeless developed an abscess on his spine that nearly killed him. Hospitalized for months, his fate was uncertain and the future of the Black Halos was equally murky. Incredibly, modern medicine put Billy back together in time for the Halos to open for the New York Dolls. Most of the audience had no idea that Billy, who twisted onstage like an epileptic on methamphetamine, had been hobbling around on a cane only days earlier. Once again, the Halos had dodged a deadly bullet. Some things never fall, indeed.

Back on his feet with no apparent signs of ill health, Billy rejoined the Halos and they continued the support tour, spending six of eight months on the road. They toured North America and gigged locally before setting off on the extensive European tour. Now the Black Halos are back in Canada, so Locat thom in a park to find out what other them. in Canada, so I met them in a park to find out what other near-death experiences they may have encountered.

The band also adds that one of their tour highlights was getting to do Boris Karloff imitations at the original castle Frankenstein, and that Adam wanted to stop at a roadside farm so he could steal a tour sheep. Billy Hopeless worked so hard onstage every night that he could barely walk by the last week and was popping more painkillers than Elvis, yet refused to take the band's advice and stay still onstage.

No sheep were harmed during this tour.



LANGSIDE BOOK REVIEW

Royal Albert Arms, Winnipeg, 5 May 2K6 Words by Kris Hunt Pics by Jeff Isaacs

Over the years, Chris Walter has done a lot of strange things at the Royal Albert

Arms in Winnipeg's Exchange district. He has taken out light bulbs; spraypainted, set fires, and performed numerous biological functions unsuitable for print. Indeed, the Albert has been a quieter place since Chris left for Vancouver in the early nineties. Still, a decade and a half of West Coast rain has not been enough to wash the Winnipeg from Chris' soul. On the fifth of May, he returned to the Albert to pull a stunt that seemed a little surreal even for Chris himself. This time Chris was selling books.

Despite the lack of postering, word had already travelled that Chris would be reading from his new book, LANGSIDE. Among those who attended, a good number of Langsidians turned out to represent the famous street, which is located literally stumbling distance from the Albert. The crowd was not large when

the show began, which Chris feels resulted from the WINNIPEG SUN and The GLOBE AND MAIL mistakenly publicizing LANGSIDE as "a book of poems." Kaspar Hauser woke up the early bird crowd and the Disappointers didn't disappoint. The author was the focus of the night, though, and Chris was busy throughout the night signing books and taking time to chat with fans. Things kicked into high gear as W.I.F.E. took the stage, holding the eager crowd enthralled with panty-games and a kickass

sound, including the best rendition of BIG BALLS I've ever experienced. The Insaniacs finished off the night with a tight and aggressive performance that had all the underage girls in a swoon. As the slam dancing and breaking glass came to an end, everyone made their way to bed for some nice bedtime reading.

LANGSIDE is Chris' tenth book in seven years and it was difficult to know what to expect. Thus far, he has gained a following for his highly readable works of fiction featuring misfits consciously reject society, choosing instead to pursue madcap adventures in the great Canadian underbelly. He has also produced an autobiographical trilogy, rife with shocking anecdotes and photographs of scantily clad ex-girlfriends, and driven by the same sense of punk rebellion that is central to

all his main characters. The influence of downtown Winnipeg and the notorious Langside area is prominent in Chris' work, fiction as well as non-fiction. LANGSIDE, however, is departure from be his home. He has been born into it, and as a teenaged boy with aboriginal blood, this means he must fight to survive his own neighbourhood as he tries to avoid the gangs who populate it. The rules of life are different on Langside, and the book details a deep understanding of the secret life of a community on the edge, while debunking the racist hegemony that serves to prejudice many Canadians against Native people. Chris himself is not of Aboriginal ancestry, but his



that is ultimately authentic to his subject matter. Not into books? You may still have a chance to experience the unique reality of Chris Walter. Deals are currently in the works to make movies based on BOOZECAN and PUNK RULES OK.
















Friday Night Murder



The early 1980s - a young man nurtured on the parental values of extreme horror, EC comics, big top prestidigitation, Evel Knievel stunt work and the decorative exhibition of rock and roll moves to New York, leaving his family in Massachusetts behind to pursue a career in publishing at Pratt Institute in Brooklyn.

Being a few years before full zombification, the young Robert Cummings never steered quite far away from the film industry which he is renowned for today, supporting himself as a lowly production assistant on Pee-Wee's Playhouse. Cummings' affinity for the lewdness of art publication was also skinny dipping in his mind at this time, as he also worked as a designer on pornographic magazines.

Becoming a director was one of Cummings' early aspirations, but the opportunity wasn't quite tearing down his door like a pack of rapacious Fulci zombies, so with the assistance of fellow designer Shauna Reynolds, Cummings busted out his bat wing blender, turned the knob to "audio" and contorted a musical message synchronical to the workings of Cummings' mind; part Misfits-esque horror rock, part satanic doom metal, and part biker rock that would later serve as an integral part of horror-metal's grisly foundations.

Named after the black and white classic starring Bela Lugosi, White Zombie was born. Cummings became Rob Straker, and Reynolds became Sean Yseult. Neither could play any instrument so they split bass and vocal duties, and starting in 1985 - subsequently released three EPs through indie label Silent Explosion with an ever fluctuating lineup of guitarists and drummers, gaining a well earned cult status in New York.

The alias Rob Zombie was first used in their debut album Soul Crusher. In 1989, Make Them Die Slowly

was released, though now both albums have been nullified. Throughout the 90s, White Zombie released two albums and one remix CD through Geffen records, the demonically possessed swamp metal of 1992's La Sexorcisto: Devil Music Vol 1, 1995's electro-industrial cathartic behemoth Astro Creep: 2000 (Songs of Love, Destruction, and other Synthetic Delusions of the Electric Head) and the remix album for that - Supersexy Swingin Sounds (featuring Rob's girlfriend Sherri Moon in some provocatively sexy half nude poses).

The sleeves for La Sexorcisto and Astro Creep featured insanely abysmal drawings by Zombie at his most demonically malignant - monsters in tight jockstraps and boxing gloves, Jesus with a Charles Manson-esque X on his forehead, tattooed clowns with liquor bottles and prosthetic hook arms, and yet even more clowns with candy cane striped socks around their penises ready to bang nurses with purple hair.

During this time, the White Zombie ship was finding a few holes in its' base, and in a promotional CD entitled Zombie Classics - 7 Hits from Hell, a Rob Zombie solo album was promoted, with the never to be heard from song "West Of Zanzibar" promised in text.

Released in 1998, Rob Zombie's first solo outing, Hellbilly Deluxe was both a commercial and financial success; toting 13 Tales of Cadaverous Cavorting Inside the Spookshow International, Rob and his new band featuring guitarist Riggs, bassist Blasko, and returning drummer from White Zombie John Tempesta, Zombie impressed old and possessed new with his infernal industrial strength casket of noise.

American Made Music To Strip By, and The Sinister Urge followed, and with success in his coat tails, Zombie looked upon his past ambitions as a film director and began making his 70s throwback,


Chainsaw inspired rumpus-a-go-go House Of 1000 Corpses. Corpses was in many ways like a Rob Zombie directed music video come to life, both maligned and celebrated by horror fans, Corpses was not a film to go unnoticed. Zombie put his legs into an even tighter pair of 1970s Levi jeans for Corpses' sequel, The Devil's Rejects. Part From Dusk Till Dawn, part Natural Born Killers, and even part Thou Shalt Not Kill, Except... The Devil's Rejects pushed the envelope to probably Antarctica with it's double whammy of documentary style monomaniacal horror and unnerving exploitation.

Marking his 20th anniversary as a musician In 2005, and after a rather long hiatus in that scene, Zombie took part in Ozzfest 2005, with former Marilyn Manson/Halford's guitarist John 5 (John Lowerly) with the returning Blasko and Tempesta and afterwards began writing music for what would be 2006's Educated Horses (Blasko left shortly after for a stint with Ozzy, bassist Matt Montgomery replaced) A more stripped down, southern approach than previous records, Horses debuted at number #5 on Billboards Top 200.


An animated feature by Zombie, titled The Haunted World Of El Superbeasto is due for release sometime this summer, and is said to be in the style of Heavy Metal and other Ralph Bakshi productions. You can bet it will have its share of sex, hard drugs, and satirical violence (in a hardy har comic book way). He may have been unearthed figuratively 20 years ago, but don't think a single gunshot to the brain will slow down this Zombie.





AU: Where did you grow up? Big J: The Sunshine Coast.

AU: What have you been up to lately? Big J: I'm trying to get some stuff published in tattoo magazines and working on a website, but it's not done yet.

AU: Did you also do graffiti in the past? Big J: I never really did huge pieces or anything, but I wrote for ESP (east side production). I just did big burns, characters and big type lettering. I also did a lot of pieces at skateparks where it was chill. I used to do it in the train yard a bit, but you get busted every now and then.

AU: I notice you've had your artwork used as graphics on skateboards.

Big J: That was the goal, it wasn't for the cash, it was just to say that i did it. It was something I wanted to do since I was a kid.

AU: Do you still skate?

Big J: Oh yeah.

AU: So you started with graffiti and skateboards? Big J: Ya, I was doing skateboard distribution plus I had a drop in house basically, right across from a skate park, with a big yard, bbq, and I'd tattooing friends. It was a good way to learn, I did that for two years.

AU: How did you get started in tattooing? Big J: The girl who did my arm, Bonny from Funhouse, she liked my artwork and I

she liked my artwork and I asked her to apprentice me, and she said OK. She got me all my gear and showed me how to make needles,

but she didn't really know much about the machines, so I learned most of that from the guys at the Funhouse, they let me hang over their shoulders and ask them questions. then I went and worked for this Biker in North Van, and that was a learning experience as well.

AU: I hear Adrenaline Tattoo is opening a new shop in Vancouver.

Big J: Yeah, we have a new shop in Kitsilano, on 4th avenue and cypress. Its a great shop! Come check us out at 1926 west 4th avenue. Or give us a call (604) 734-8282.

AU: So who's gonna be working there? BJ: We got this guy named Aaron, a guy from Alberta named Trevor, Richard, and myself.

AU: Where was the first shop originally? Big J: The first shop opened up eight years ago in Seaside Heights, New Jersey.

AU: How many locations are there? Big J: Two here, three in Jersey, and one in Montreal.

AU: And the artists sometimes rotate and travel around?

BJ: Yup. They are cool like that, they'll send you out, if you've worked for them a little while. It's a little incentive, they send you somewhere else, and most of the guys at the other shops are pretty cool.

AU: Like a family thing?

Big J: Yup, they have a recipe for success. You don't normally see a shop like this. I ask people, why do you come to Adrenaline? And it's either because they've seen our artists work on other people, or their friends have recommended them, the staff is friendly, and it's not intimidating. You walk into some shops and it can be kind of intimidating, especially if you have never been tattooed or pierced before. Our shop has so much merchandise and other stuff to look at, people don't feel pressured. A lot of our customers are first timers, and it's nice for them to have a place where they can get tattooed and feel comfortable.

AU: Who's the best artist at VanCity Adrenaline?

Big J: They are all awesome. That's the good part at having a handful of artist. Between all of us, we can tattoo anything.

It's the payoff from the long weekend, one of the few times a year you can really give'r on a Sunday night and you know you can sleep Monday away. Myself, Sean and Brett from Divinity were able to step away from all of the scantily clad women (it was +30 that day) and get the word on what's going on with an album, a lineup change and a summer tour. When was your last show?

Why the delay

Has Divinity ever taken it on the Road?

Brett: Western Canada, for sure, we have played Vancouver 4 times in the last 3 or 4 years, Sean: we go there every year, whenever we can, also Saskatchewan and sometimes Manitoba.

What's your view on Satan – it's our 666 issue – does he influence your sound?

Brett: Here is my view on Satan, I want to see Satan and Jesus in a boxing ring and whoever wins I will go with... but being that Satan is more into metal I have to side with him.

Wasn't that an episode of South Park?

Sean: Well Satan is the ultimate evil, and with metal, if you put in an evil element it makes it cooler. Like Slayer incorporates the devil and that's their thing.

Brett: When Slayer did it, it was so different, it was new to be a Satanic band, Now, when bands do that it's kinda cheesy cause it's been done for 20 years already.

Sean: But we like the evil element, recently we have used some evil chords with more progressions into our music, so satan is in there, but he isn't the leader that's for sure. Brett: He's a partner in crime and that's it.

So tell me about this new album.

Sean: It will be called Allegory, it's a full-length album, 10 songs, we are doing it up as professionally and as great sounding as we can make it. We are putting up a lot of cash, and so far it is fucking awesome. It's just a matter of time...

Where do you guys get content for your lyrics?

Sean: Since I am the singer I usually write all the lyrics, but I always run it by the guys and they see what I am saying. But the inspiration is usually an experience I had or something I see or how I feel about it basically or how it pisses me off or how fucked up it is.

Brett: We are a band that we don't like to get into crazy stuff when we are writing, we write about real stuff, what we see and feel. No bullshit kind of thing.

Sean: Cannibal Corpse writes about gore and guts and blood, it's just that every time. We like to expand on the perception of how we see things.

Brett: It's our view of whatever the hell we are talking about I 'spose. Agree with it or don't.

How did you come up with the name Divinity?

Sean: In Pantera – Domination – there is a lyric "a now blacked heart reaching out in divinity" I thought that word was so kick-ass, and I looked it up and it means a god like figure – so I thought that was wicked to have a huge fucking name like that.

Satan

Sean: Could go either way, just an ultimate power

Brett: Lord Satan

Sean: That's cool, it works for metal...

Brett: We aren't a band that pushes religion of any kind or anything, we like to say do your own thing, have your own god whatever you look up to, makes you a better person, makes you happy that's your divinity, that's your god.

Do you think you fall into any category? Black metal, Grindcore?

Sean: I see us falling into a thrash metal or death metal. We put in some melody parts so we kind of have a progressive feel to it, but not totally progressive by any means.

Brett: Since we are working on our first full-length album we aren't where we want to be in finding out sound, some bands take 4 or 5 albums to discover that. We are younger guys we have lots of room to expand on playability and finding out sound. So right now we fit into thrashy death metal but down the road that will probably change. We like to discover other things, either extreme grind kinda things or extreme clean vocals or whatever else. We aren't against anything

Brett: our influences range hugely like lighter stuff like Pain of Salvation and Evergrey to Nile and Morbid Angel for death metal or jazzy stuff like Spastic Ink or Planet X, it goes all over the place. So with all those alums we build our own sound.

So fill me in on the basic timeline of your band?

Sean: Started 9 years ago – this lineup is 3 years old. Our new bass player, Nick Foster, is really working hard and showing great dedication.

Brett: Found him in an ad and kept jamming with him and he didn't let us down. We're almost 5 months into it, he has a great attitude, plays great, team player, knows how to play his instrument, happy to have him aboard. So since just having the 4 dudes we have been strong but since adding the 5th, it has been great.

Could you guys handle the Weed Olympics when you hit Victoria?

Sean: We are fairly experienced.

Brett: we will probably have to wait till after the show, otherwise I won't play a worth a damn

They don't think the Calgary bands can stand up to the test?

Sean: It is crazy out there, BC bud is world class, but Calgary does get good stuff, they say it is from B.C. But when you go to Van and smoke that BC bud and you get so damn high, you are baked for like 5 hours. We do smoke a fair amount of weed, but nothing like over in the weed homeland there.

Brett: It's not helping us any... but you know.

Sean: We'll practice with the Calgary stuff for now and get geared up for that crazy BC stuff this summer





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
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




June 6th, 2006, the sixth day of the sixth month of the sixth year (of this century). The International day of Slayer, also apparently the release date for the new Slayer album (whatever it's called), the release date for the re-make of the movie "The Omen" and the re-opening date for the legendary Cobalt, although there aren't any Slayer cover bands playing, At least my band, The Business Associates are playing, and we have some Slayer influenced riffs, and quitar solos.

I first heard Slayer around 1986 with the album "Reign in Blood". It totally blew me away, not having heard anything guite as intense or talented before that. I was already into metal, but the heaviest stuff I listened to at that time was Venom or Metallica. Venom was pretty heavy, but not the most talented, and Metallica was talented but not that heavy, or evil sounding. The evil sound is the most important factor of Slayer for me and a lot of other people I know. Because of Slayer's Reign in Blood, and then later on discovering "Hell Awaits" and other earlier albums, it opened a lot of doors for me as far as other music I listened to and my own guitar playing. I got into other stuff like Celtic Frost, Kreator, Sacrifice, Voivod (R.I.P., Piggy) and then later Death Metal, Grind Core, and Black Metal such as Death, Pestilence, Morbid Angel, Carcass, Napalm Death, Blasphemy and so on.

About the evil riffs, Slayer most impressed me with the evil,dark and aggressive sound. My favorite albums are tied, "Hell Awaits" and "Reign in Blood". The last couple

of Slaver albums have too much of a Nu Metal or Mall Metal influence for me to get into. My friend Dan Scum explained it like this "The difference between classic Slaver and new Slayer is that old Slayer is evil while new Slayer sounds like the theme music wrestlers use on WWE". Most of classic Slayer does not have that tough guy metal sound with stupid choppy riffs that mostly revolve around an open E power chord. At least Slayer hasn't lost there edge in the guitar solo department. But, the solos on "Hell Awaits" and "Reign in Blood" stood out the most for me. I can remember a few occasions, when I was younger doing lots of acid at parties, but the best was in 1992 or 93, when a friend and I took about a dozen hits each. I kept hearing whammy bar laden Slayer style guitar solos as background noise all night while partying at the Hillside Hellhouse in Victoria. We actually had been listening to "Reign in Blood" earlier that night, but even when we weren't listening to music I heard Slayer-ish guitar solos all night.

Slaver's Influence:

Not just on me, but in general. Slayer was and is considered one of the top, most influential Thrash Metal bands of all time, especially because of the "Reign In Blood" album. You can hear their influence in other thrash metal bands like Kreator, Dark Angel, Forbidden, and so on. Slayer not only influenced Thrash Metal, but they also had a pretty huge impact on the Crossover movement in the mid-late eighties and through the nineties. D.R.I., Verbal Abuse, Dead Kennedys and other punk bands, and Metal bands like Priest and Iron Maiden influenced Slayer. In return, Slayer influenced bands like Wasted Youth, Ninth

Hour, CrumbSuckers, AMQA, Grave Mistake and shit loads of other bands, and probably later stuff from D.R.I.

Later on, of course, Slayer's influence can be seen in all the other off-shoot sub-genre Metal scenes. Death Metal bands like Death, Obituary, Malevolent Creation, Monstrosity and others all owe Slayer a lot. Then of course, Grind Core bands like Carcass, then Grind/Death Metal crossover bands like Suffocation, and a lot of Black Metal bands like Emperor, Mayhem (the earlier shit) Burzum etc. all bear the mark of Slayer's influence, both musically and lyrically.

Considering the subject of Slaver's lyrics, most people think of Satan. Slaver has also used other controversial subjects such as Nazism, Abortion, Religious and political corruption, in my opinion without really taking much of clear stance on any of the topics, rather simply stating facts (a lot like Macabre's lyrics, except not focusing solely on serial killers.) Back in the late eighties, Bob Larson a famous (or infamous) Christian radio talk show host. most notable for his attacks on cults, the occult, and so called Satanic rock, toured with Slayer, if I can remember correctly, for the South of Heaven tour. According to Bob Larson, a lot of Slayer's Satanic lyrics and imagery were mostly theatrical and for show. Surprisingly, in the recent Metal documentary, "Metal: A Headbanger's Journey", by Victoria's Sam Dunn, Tom Araya admits to being a practicing Catholic and that Slayer's Satanic lyrics and imagery are mostly just theatrical or simply to bring up topics of religious corruption.



RANDOM SLAYER TRIVIA

Apparently, when Slayer first started forming in 1981, Tom Araya was working as a respiratory therapist in an L.A. hospital.

Dave Lombardo, Slayer's drummer, has been in and out of the band three times.

In 1982 Slayer first started playing live doing mostly covers of Judas Priest and Iron Maiden.

Around the same time Slayer started, there was actually another Slayer, from San Antonio Texas. Slayer S.A., Texas, was not as fast, evil or aggressive as the band Slayer that we all know and love. The other Slayer was more speed metal, semi-power metal type music, similar to Liege Lord, Tyrant, Tokyo Blade, Metal Church, etc.

The album "Hell Awaits" begins with the words "Join Us" recorded backwards, very evil!








































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
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

Thanks to Metal Blade Michelle setting up the interview with Alex Webster bassist of Gore Metal extremists Cannibal Corpse.

It's rad when you're on hold at the Metal Blade Records office waiting for an interview because instead of sappy elevator music they rock you with some deadly shredding metal riffs instead. So this is what 9am looks like after a night out on the town. Ouch! OK here we go..

Absolute Underground: How's it going?

Alex: Good. How are you?

AU: Not bad. It's a bit early for me but it's all good. Alex: Cool

AU: Could you identify yourself for the record?

Alex: Sure. This is Alex Webster bass player of Cannibal

AU: Nice. How long has the band been around? Where and how did it all begin?

Alex: We got together in Buffalo, New York, which is where the original line-up of the band all grew up. That was in December of 1988. When we got together we had known each other from our previous bands which were local extreme metal bands from around the Buffalo area. We got signed to Metal Blade records in a relatively short time. That occurred about seven months after we got the band together. So it was pretty quick.

${\it AU: Right on. What were some of your early musical influences?}$

Alex: When we got Cannibal together the bands we were listening to were Slayer, Sodom, Kreator, Death, and Morbid

AU: What's your favorite Slayer album and song?

Alex: Definitely Reign In Blood is my favorite Slayer album by far and although that entire album is amazing, I think Alter of Sacrifice might be one of my favorite songs. It's an incredible tune.

AU: Have you auvs ever played with Slaver?

Alex: We've done a couple festivals where they were also playing but we've never done an actual tour with them.

AU: Did you listen to punk rock growing up as well?

Alex: Yeah, I listened to a little bit, I was definitely a metalhead but I did check out some punk rock. Especially bands like Black Flag, Dead Kennedys, Circle Jerks and all the classic stuff.

AU: What's your favorite zombie movie?

Alex: There's a lot of good ones but I think the one that's just called Zombie by Lucio Fulci is my favorite.

AU: Have you ever seen the movie called The Passion of Zombie Jesus? Alex: The Passion of Zombie Jesus? Hahaha. No I haven't seen it but it sounds like a good one

AU: Would Cannibal Corpse ever do a song about Zombie Jesus?

Alex: About Zombie Jesus? Umm... no, we probably wouldn't do anything like that but I mean we've got enough other zombie songs. So who knows? We've got a lot more songs to write too so we'll see what happens.

AU: What was the main theme of your newest album KILL?

Alex: Well even though we don't really ever have full on themes for our albums, I mean really each song is individual. On the album KILL most of the songs seem to be really

aggressive and violent. So I would say that the theme, if there is one, would just be that of primitive violence and

AU: What's your take on the approaching June 6th, 2006 Hell Night?

Alex: Oh, the 666 day? It's an interesting date and everything. I'm sure everybody who's into Satan and the whole thing will be pretty excited. For us we don't really care or anything. I'm sure there'll be a party or something to go to that night. Every band in the world is like releasing their album on that day, so there will be a lot of good metal albums coming out on 06 06 06 that's for sure.

AU: You guys aren't playing any big shows that night? Alex: We're not playing that night actually, we're gonna be busy rehearsing for the upcoming Sounds of the Underground tour we're doing in July. It should be

a great tour. We've never had a chance to play with so many different kinds of band on one tour before so we're pretty excited about it.

AU: What's the next crazy shit some mutant kids in some basement are going to come up?

Alex: Musically? Well, I think it's just unlimited actually what's gonna happen. There's so many good young musicians out there that it's impossible to tell what could happen but I think it's gonna be good whatever it is. For a number of different reasons there's just a real growth in the quality of extreme metal and death metal. Reasons like technology, there's greater availability of quality musical instruction for young people so there's a lot of potential. Whatever the next big thing is, I'm sure it's already in the process of being made and we're just gonna have to wait to find out what it is when the youngster that's writing it unleashes it upon the world.

AU: What are some newer bands that people should check out?

Alex: Well these bands have each been around for a couple of years but I'll list a couple that I really like. There's Spawn of Possession Visceral Bleeding and Aeon all from Sweden. where we just toured with Aeon, so maybe that's why they're on my mind but they really are three of the best new bands around. Those I would recommend. There's a lot more too, there's Blastmasters from Florida, Severed Savior from

California, there's a lot of great bands out there these days.

AU: Do you remember when you played in Victoria?

Alex: Of course, that was with Severed Savior. We really enjoyed playing the show up there. We didn't realize that there would be such a big scene in Victoria because it was so close to Vancouver. In Vancouver we had a really good show and we didn't know what to expect out of Victoria and the show ended up being approximately the same size as far as audience turnout and we were really happy with it. When we come back and do another tour of Canada I hope we're able to go to Victoria again because it was definitely worth the trip on the ferry to get over there and play.

AU: Were you aware that Victoria is the Satanic Capital of Canada? Alex: It is? The Satanic Capital? That's fucking great! Me and my wife just went there on vacation.

AU: Did you visit Ross Bay Cemetery? Are you aware of the underground black metal scene that was built around it by hands like Blasnhemy?

Alex: I've never heard of that, no. I know about Blasphemy of course, but I've never heard of that graveyard. Is that the one from Fallen Angel of Doom? Where they took the

pictures?

AU: Yeah, they have some eerie statues and there was that book Michelle Remembers about demonic child possession. It's all real man. Alex: I never heard about that actually.

AU: Who does all the bands sickening artwork?

Alex: Well, Vincent Locke did all of the official artwork. We've had a couple t-shirts made that were made with different artists and the Hammer Smashed Face EP was drawn without our permission actually and released by the European Label without our prior knowledge so we didn't approve that piece of art even though it's kinda cool l auess.

AU: Vincent Locke does that zombie comic Deadworld as well right?

Alex: That's correct. He also actually did the graphic novel A History Of Violence that they just made that movie about last year.

AU: Should Ozzy pack it in?

Alex: Ozzy? I don't know. I like Ozzy Osbourne.

AU: Beer or Pot?

Alex: Beer

AU: Upcoming tours other than Sounds of the Underground?

Alex: We're going to Australia in October and probably to Japan directly after that just for one show called the Beast Feast. After that there's the possibility of doing another American tour sometime then we'll probably be going to Europe in February. It's going to be a pretty busy schedule for us for awhile

That's all in support of our new album KILL.

AU: Any Last Rites?

Alex: I just want to say thank you to everybody who came out and saw us play in Victoria and hopefully we'll get back there because we had a great time. Thanks to anybody out there who's reading who supports Cannibal and the Death Metal scene



Absolute Underground - What's new with Jeremy Klein? What's on the shredule? Jeremy Klein - Well, I have a dog

now. I have had her for a few years

AU - Nice, what kind? Does it help you pick up airls?

Jeremy Klein - She is a black labrador, her name is AKIKO. (japanese name. means: bright/smart child) I haven't used her yet to pick up chicks, but that would totally work. I actually haven't had to resort to it yet, I will if I have to though!

AU - How did you get into skateboarding?

AU - What's the craziest thing you guys have ever done together?

AU - R u drunk by any chance?


Jeremy Klein - Actually no, I wish I

STRIKER - Well that's what Attack of Danger bay is all about. If you go to the sanctioned I.G.S.A race you get a set of wheels if you win and if you touch a guy or something they're bitchin'. Here you never know what you're going to get, you know? Let's get rough, let's race, let's punch each other and bail. It's two fucking grand for first place you know. Buddy was in front and it was wet and Brian just drove him into the hay. And that's the way it is.

JAK - What about the DANGER BAY CUP? STRIKER - The cup holds three beers and you can smoke hash out of it too. It had a couple huge knifes on the top because at Danger Bay 3 we got attacked by hicks with hockey sticks. We made a trophy to guard the champion of Danger Bay so it had a couple of huge knives on it. The cup was, well, we got inspired by the JAK'S SKATE TEAM about five years ago and they showed us skate hockey and I was hoping we could have some skate hockey this year but hopefully next year we will.

At the new Renegade Studios, the five members of Hong Kong Blonde are hanging out, contemplating a practice, in a not-so-well-ventilated room, but it is clean and instead of crusty carpeting with beer stains and cigarette holes there is a blue tile floor. The band is quick to divulge that I am the first female to grace the space (they are, from what I can tell of the meandering three-hour conversation, wary of Yoko Onos) and this is their first real interview—surprisingly, since the band's been around for seven years.

Perhaps you've even heard about them over in Victoria, they almost played at Logan's Pub, during the show that turned into Taser Fest.

"That was the fastest I've ever seen six cops show up in my whole life," says John, vocals. "It was like they were waiting around the corner."

"We were supposed to go on right after [the Neo Nasties]," says Curtis, guitar, "But then as they started playing...it was quite the gong show, really. The Victoria police are really taser happy."

Curtis is the conversationalist bass player (ask him to tell you why "once a smoker always a smoker" is literally true). He's a computer programmer with a watch that looks as if it's been designed by NASA. He is also a picky eater. For instance: he's never tasted pineapple. He does, however, like hotdogs. "I don't eat barely anything but meat." he admits.

When the original singer/bass player, Drew, moved to some remote woods with his family to live Swiss Family Robinson style...or something along the lines, the four piece decided to become a five piece. The replacement bass player came in the form of Mike, an intimidating looking kick boxer who once had the pleasure of witnessing his own brain fluid shoot out his nose during a sparring match. He is also the band's handy man and fixes whatever breaks. According to John, he's also the one who doesn't care where when or how they play, as long as they play.

John is the singer, perhaps the antithesis of Drew. With a permanent scowl, a history in the Intense band Fratricide, and lyrics like the song about John Wayne Gacie, he comes across as the most "hard-core" of the band. Says Curtis, "Everyone is super mellow and then John in more aggro to counteract the mellowness so it all balances out."

Eric is the not-so-new drummer, replacing the original drummer who "didn't want to play fast stuff". In a moment of vulnerable honesty, or perhaps exceeding his tolerance for raspberry coolers—all of which the band drinks—he admits halfway through the interview that he moved out to Vancouver with the ambition to be their drummer.

"Whatever," says Curtis, in disbelief. This leads to a discussion of how Eric, with his then band at the time, Career Suicide, first heard of Hong Kong Blonde.

Founding member Pete, guitar, (his watch comes with a universal remote control for TVs, recommended by Curtis) is the other remaining original member and according to Eric, "despite his appearance is a neurotic Woody Allen-type", which may or may not be true as is the case with anything that comes out of the droll drummer's mouth. Pete is also the music writer for the band who, according to the band, "pumps new shit out all the time."

So how is it that Hong Kong Blonde has received nothing by way of media attention despite the respect and notoriety they've earned in the underground scene over the years?

"That's the most important thing that could be said about this band," says Eric. "We're probably the laziest people when it comes to band stuff."

And while it's true they never use a set list, and rarely bother with sound checks, the music is not lazy. A self-described freight train through a china shop, is nearly the best way to describe the songs that border on chaos but remain on track, like a wrecking ball swinging in fast forward, while you're frozen on the receiving end. What's interesting is the difference between their new material and their older stuff, when Drew was the singer. There is a bit of a rock tinge to those ones, as in the aptly titled "Rock and Roll", which is less apparent in the new tougher material of "Into the Darkness" or "Skulls".

Most of the songs are written by Drew, before he moved with his family into the wild.

"He's sort of a recluse," says Pete.

"When these guys asked me come try out for the band, or whatever, he showed up at one practice, about three-quarters of the way through played two songs left and that was my only meeting with him," says John. "I felt kind of awkward, like 'am I supposed to be here?""

According to the band they didn't know at the time Drew would be leaving but it was evident he'd

lost interest in the band. There was no bad blood, however, and they're grateful for the continued use of his lyrics. "Big thanks to Drew for writing a bunch of songs and letting us take'em, and record'em," says Curtis.

"They're not ordinary hardcore topics," says Eric. "It's not I hate this or I hate that and nothing vaguely political about them. I just really think his lyrics stand up. He was filthy, and he stank, but he's like a genius, intellectual hillbilly."

As contradictory as the band's preference for coolers is their easy going attitudes and straightforward demeanors. You'd think they'd be playing in some emo outfit or Surf Rock Five, not living in Vancouver pounding out plaintive vehemence in dive bars all over the East Side.

"We're influenced by a lot of Vancouver bands," says Pete. "Fratricide, Mission of Christ, Death Sentence."

"DOA, NEOS, House of Commons, Accused, Poison Idea, Beyond Possession," continues Eric.

"That's what we grew up on," says Mike.

"I've always liked this kind of music," says Curtis, "but I've never had friends who were into it..."

While there are those still trying to figure out what the band's name stands for (a race horse), unlike the "Gaylord power band" with the same moniker these guys have absolutely no image and despite this they still get penged

"We've played dumpy basement shows with other hardcore bands," says Eric. "And I think they kind of look at us a little sideways because we have decent gear and vaguely flashy guitars."

I point an ironic finger to the only guitar lying about; a candy-red Gibson Flying V held together with duck tape.

"You just look at us and we don't look like punks or whatever..." he explains.

Mike: "Because we're all in our 30s."

In the end, media attention is irrelevant to these five, as is touring—even if a couple of them, at least, would hit the road in a second. But there are families involved. The band is a hobby and this seems to be enough. They are working on an album and have recorded more than one past demo with local producer, Jesse Gadner.

"It'll be a 12"," says Curtis. "And then the CD will have everything we've ever done." "We've recorded like four demos but never gave them to anybody."

As it turns out, all that's holding them back from getting it out into public hands is a lack of cover art. The Logo now, designed by a friend of John's, is two skulls atop which are perch crows, but a new CD calls for power artwork.

"Andrew W.K. Stole my last idea of a picture of me on the cover with blood running down my face," says John.

"You know what I had in mind," said Eric," Stop me if you've heard this one before: a skeleton on a skateboard with a Mohawk."

The band feels the need to thank Steve Chase of Fireball productions; the few shows they played in Vancouver over their first five years were at the Pic. These days, it's the Cellar, or the Astoria, or wherever the Heaven's collide to provide them with a show that requires absolutely no effort to book.

"We're really happy with Wendy she treats us well, I think," says Eric, when the subject of their most recent show is broached. "I like the Astoria."

"The sound is really good there," adds Curtis. "Everywhere we play I can never hear anything, at the Astoria the guy's always on top of things."

I tell him that John the Sound Man can recall the days when beer was only ten cents.

"He was at Altamonte," says Eric, talking about the music festival, in the 70s, where Angels were hired to do security and when things got out of hand, took care of it Angel style.

This conversation veers directly into rehashing of events of the Manson murders until the singer interrupts everyone, voice bordering on impatience, and says, "How did it go from the Astoria show, to Altamonte to the Manson family?"

"This isn't an "interview" interview," asks Curtis, as my tape runs out, again. "We can just chat, right?" www.myspace.com/hongkongblonde

Horde of Anachron 2006 demo

This demo is a taste of what HoA are about and it has a clean sound on their guitar, vocal, and drum assault. Band members Necrodonis, Berg and Primordial have constructed songs of traditional marching metal with moments of onslaught speed. -ricky jak

BAL-SAGOTH: THE CHTHONIC CHRONICLES

For over 10 years, Bal-Sagoth has been creating a unique amalgamation of power, black, thrash and death metal, with the addition of neoclassical keyboard compositions reminiscent of movie soundtracks. This is GAMER metal. Pure and simple: if you're D&D/Fantasy-dorks like us you will be absolutely stunned with the sheer musical and thematic concepts this band has to offer. If you don't like this album, you don't like music, and that's the bottom line!



The Greatest Underground Show on Earth Cyclone Records

Fourteen tracks from fourteen distinct Calgary metal bands are slapped together on this album like an incredibly diverse sandwich. A tasty and deliciously assorted death, thrash, power, and speed metal sandwich, that is, Stand out tracks for me are "Shredfest" by Inspected by 40 and "Hate Therapy" by Wormbox. 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
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
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LUCIFER VALENTINE 666 VOMIT GORE HARDCORE

Lucifer Valentine 666 is originally from Arniston, South Africa. He's an artist who likes to make movies, drawings, and music. He is what they called an Emetophile, which

means that he has a sexual attraction to vomit or vomiting. Lucifer Valentine is a a self-proclaimed Satanist who's favorite movie is GUMMO, and who's favorite band is the MELVINS.

Tell us about the films you've made:

My first movie is called SLAUGHTERED VOMIT DOLLS and in making this movie I created a new genre of film called VOMIT GORE. I am currently making a Vomit Gore Trilogy, and am nearly finished shooting the second installment in the Trilogy entitled "ReGOREgitated Sacrifice".

What got you started and how did you come up with the original idea?

I have traveled for most of my life and am constantly videotaping and making journal entries, and while on a trip to America, I was visiting friends in Seattle, Washington, and I had occasion to walk by Kurt Cobain's house. I am obsessed with the band MELVINS, and have been for many, many years, and I always thought it was so interesting that Kurt Cobain idolized the Melvins when he was starting to play in bands, and that they were from the same town, Aberdeen,

Washington. I also LOVED Nirvana, and was very sad when Cobain took his life, and I was mesmerized, standing outside his house for a very long time.

I am also thoroughly obsessed with Carl Jung's theory of Synchronicity, which postulates that if there are enough so-called coincidences, that at first seem to be "acausal", or meaningless, but are all piled up on each other, and are all tangled up in some kind of progression of a narrative, -- although at first seemingly unrelated and fragmented — they can create a snowball effect of exponential coincidental meaning, and when these coincidences surround an event or a related series of events, they can surpass the "threshold

of coincidence", and can reveal a much deeper, profound, beautiful, transcendent meaning. A good concise example of Synchronicity is outlined at the very beginning of P.T. Anderson's movie Magnolia.

So, I was standing outside Kurt Cobain's house, when my cell phone

rang and it was my then girlfriend, Ameara LaVey, calling me from Vancouver, BC, Canada, asking me when I might come up to visit her. I just kept staring at Cobain's house and said, "We're going to make a movie about a dimension of the parapsychological synchronistic events that took place during the Last Six Days of Kurt Cobain's Life." And she said, "Great! Wow, that sounds pretty wild, when are you coming to see me?"

So, SLAUGHTERED VOMIT DOLLS is the depiction of the Death of a girl named Angela Aberdeen, and what led up to her suicide during the EXACT SAME TIME period as Kurt Cobain's Suicide.

Who were some of your inspirations?

Harmony Korine, Crispin Glover, the fine folks who made Guinea Pig, David Lynch, Paul Reubens, Maxhardcore, G.G. Allin, Joseph Merrick, Kenneth Anger, Herschell Gordon Lewis, Joe Spinell...

What's the obsession with gore and vomit?

Well , I've always drawn pictures of mutilated, decapitated, dismembered, tortured, burned, scarred, butchered, sacrificed, deformed people my entire life from when I was a very small child – then, when I first began to watch movies, I naturally only rented the most extreme things available, and would go to great lengths to seek out these kinds of extreme movies. I became an Emetophile when I was an adult while staying with friends in Helsinki, Finland, when one night they had a Maxhardcore Marathon, and showed me countless hours of his unedited and most extreme movies. I remember seeing two girls deep throat MaxHardcore's cock until they puked all over it. I remember really liking this a lot, and I thought it looked like

people from another planet, or parallel dimension of humans that LOOK exactly the way we do, but do not function sexually or emotionally as we Earthlings do, we just share a similar atmosphere and body structure so we bear a physical resemblance but that's where the similarities end!

AU - Where have your films been shown?

Recently SLAUGHTERED VOMIT DOLLS was shown at the New York Film and Video Festival, and it has been show in several underground art galleries and nightclubs in many different countries and I can't remember the names of all those places cuz lots of them don't even

tell me they're gonna show it, and I just find out about it later. Originally ALL of the major Horror Film Festivals rejected my movie; my executive producer urged me to send SLAUGHTERED VOMIT DOLLS to festivals even though I really didn't want to, but I did anyway, and I got tons of hilarious responses of outrage and disgust so I guess it was worth it for that reason.

AU - What's the casting process like? Do the people have to be able to vomit on command?

Lucifer Valentine - I normally just work with close friends, or people that are introduced to me by my friends of people I've already worked with. They only need to vomit when

we are shooting the Vomit Gore scene in the movie, or if I am having sex with them.

AU - Do you consider yourself a Satanist?

Lucifer Valentine - I am a Satanist.

AU - What have you got planned for the future?

Lucifer Valentine - I plan to make the Vomit Gore Trilogy, then another Trilogy after that, but I can't say what it is yet!! And I plan to make movies till I am too old to move.

AU - What do you think about the band slaver?

I absolutely LOVE Slayer!! The record Reign In Blood was a big influence on me (duh) and I still listen to it to this day!!

AU - Favorite bands and horror films?
