

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# **Ho-Tonk Heroes**

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VICTORIAS'LOCALS'ONLY' if I wanted to play didgeridoo at their show that night. I was like, "Yeah! That sounds great!". Then they handed me a hockey card that

had a picture of a guy holding a chainsaw on it. My didaeridoo was later sacrificed to the art of rock.

#### AU: Didgeridont. What is Ho-Tonk?

It's the style of music that we play. It is in fact the only music we know how to play. We are the best Ho-Tonk band of history, not only because we are the only Ho-Tonk band, but because we


# AU: Do you have a song



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# Kilyakai's **Inspired Existence**

t's been a long and challenging year in the making, but Kilyakai's full-length debut is finally ready for release.

On October 23, the hardcore influenced death metal juggernaut from Calgary, Alberta, will unleash Devastate Insisted Existence on a local audience, followed by a cross-province series of shows to further spread the metal fury, before taking it online.

"We did extensive amount of writing and a lot of practicing, a lot of string sessions, just ironing out all the little bugs. And we took some time off from doing shows iust to focus on the material and decide which songs we actually wanted to put on the album," says Mike Porteous, one half of the band's dual guitar onslaught. According to Porteous, the band has

more songs than there was space on a CD, so they had to sit down and figure out which ones were going to make the cut.

'It was more of a debate as a band. Everybody had their input," he explains, leaning back in the office chair at Slaughterhouse Studios, where the bulk of the album was produced by the bands own bassist, Nate Renaud.

"We all decided which songs we thought were the best that we agreed on, and those are the ones we used," chimes in second guitarist, Adam Vagacs. "And it was pretty much unanimous," Porteous

smiles, obviously stoked about the release, and a little anxious to get back on the live circuit. These guys thrive on live performance, and

anyone that's taken in a Kilyakai show can tell you that. The quintet definitely has chemistry on stage, which begs the question: did they manage to capture that in the recording studio?

"I recommend people see us live before you dive into our album and get to know us, because once you see us live..." interjects drummer Ryan Boyko as he walks into the office at Slaughterhouse, followed by Renaud and vocalist, Wes DeLeeuw.

They've just wrapped things up and it's time to chill out for a while. As everyone finds a place to sit or lean or perch, the room slowly gets darker as the sun sets outside, is if reflecting the winding down of all the countless hours of work that's gone into Devastate Insisted Existence up to this

AU: The songs on the album, are they songs you were already playing live, or are there joing to be some that we haven't yet heard

Adam Vagacs: When we first started the album, most of them we didn't play live at all, they were iust for the CD.

Mike Porteous: But now we showcase one or two when we play live.

#### AU: Which ones?

Porteous: "Infidel" is one of the newest ones.

Vagacs: "Without Warning"

**Porteous:** Those are all pretty new songs, as far as a live audience is concerned

# AU: And how has the reaction been so far?

**Vagacs:** They seem to be getting into the experience. I would say they're liking it even more than the other stuff, so I can't wait until they have the new album and know the songs better.

**Porteous:** The song "Blackwing" is about the metal community coming together and helping each other because we're all under the "Blackwing."

Porteous: I feel like it's got a little more death influence, as far as brutal, technical riffs. It seems everything is harder. Every song is harder to play. Vagacs: It's gotten heavier; it's more technical.

But the writing process has become way more organic, and we've learned to write together better, so they songs don't feel as forced.

Do you find it's your own maturity as musicians that's making everything more difficult, more technical, or are you actively seeking out new techniques?

Vagacs: I'm always looking for new ways to play and new ways to apply those techniques.

Porteous: I'm always learning. Every time Vagacs shows me a new riff, it's always the hardest thing I've had to play.

#### You wanted to tell us something about the thesis behind the lyrics...

**DeLeeuw:** It is and it isn't a concept album. It's a concept album in the fact that we are kind of approaching the whole decimation of the human race and the Earth being cleansed by either fire or a meteor hitting it or something of that nature. so I guess it is in that aspect. It definitely has something to do with us all being obliterated.

With all this obliterating going on, how does it affect how intense things get in the percussion

Ryan Boyko: It's changed throughout the whole process. I mean, during recording, there were ideas that came out that weren't in the original blueprint of the beast. But it was always evolving We'd record something and hear it and decide to

#### What can you tell us about Marcela Bolivar and how she ended up designing the cover art?

**DeLeeuw:** I kind of actually fluked out on it. We tried a couple artists and they weren't up to snuff and I was kind of aggravated by that, so one day I just went on the Internet and Googled "dark art" and her website, Gray Decay, was the first thing that came up and it was magic. We told her that we wanted something that was abrasive and destructive.

#### How does the cover reflect the music?

**DeLeeuw:** Perfectly, I think Kilvakai on a whole reflects that whole devastated existence.

With all said and done with this recording, what will you do differently next time?

**DeLeeuw:** Take more time in pre-production. **Vagacs:** Practice more. Mental prep is a huge thing too with progressive death thrash music.

# What do you hope people get out of this

Renaud: I hope people get pumped up. I hope they hear what I hear

Vagacs: I just want people to like it and appreciate the work that went into it.

Boyko: Yeah, just get inspired by it and know that you can be a part of whatever you want no matter what it is, you can do it, and hopefully you can realize that through hearing this.

From the frozen tundra of central Manitoba, this notorious punk rock band needs little introduction. Churning out politically motivated hybrid thrash/punk for over 20 years they've pretty much run the gamut - toured the world, kicked ass, took names, adopted alternate personalities, put out self admitted shameful songs & albums and they're still left standing. Taking a young Todd Kowalski under their wing in the late 90s they have progressively gone in new and some may say far better directions. I got a chance to hash it out with "the Rod" recently in anticipation of October 27th, when their long awaited return to BC comes to fruition with a much anticipated performance @ the Rickshaw theater in Vancouver with support from locals The Rebel Spell on the Lock Up Your Grandmothers

#### AU: Ok first things first Todd, Do Jords farts smell worse with age?

Todd: They still shock me every time so they've probably gotten worse as my biology tries to cope with the trauma.

AU: Each release since the groundbreaking Todays Empires has been distinctly different, with the latest, Supporting Caste being ar amalgamation and almost s

Todd: We had no thought beyond just trying to make good songs that we'd want to listen to. We're always practicing hard and trying to get better. We love music and want to be a great band. Whether we succeed in that journey or not doesn't really matter. The fact is that we are really trying our best to rock as hard as we can.

AU: When you started the band, did you ever think you'd win a Songwriting prize? ["A Speculative Fiction" won the 2006 ECHO songwriting award]

Todd: As a young listener in the very early 90s, before I was in the band. I would've

given Propagandhi a prize for "Who Will Help Me Bake This Bread". We've never sought out to win any prizes or be part of anything like that. It just happened. We don't really put too much stock in it. It's just as meaningful to hear positive comments from the average listeners.

AU: Musically & lyrically, in my humble opinion, "Night Letters" is likely the greatest song you have written – where did the idea for it come from?





# "Die for Dethklok" Interview with creator **Brendon Small**

## AU: Did you make it down to San Diego Comic-Con this

Brendon Small: I did not, I am always happy when I don't have to go to be honest. They're always filled with giant nerds & I have grown tired of the smell of B.O.

AU: I do a comic called Zombie Jesus vs. Robot Hitler, so maybe one day we can have Zombie Jesus fight Dethklok!

Brendon: As far as I'm concerned, everybody should be able to fight anybody, so go for it!

AU: You started with a show geared for kids called Home Movies, tell us about the transition into the far

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Brendon: I had just graduated from music school and I had started doing stand-up and live sketch

omedy in Boston, luckily I met up with producer who wanted me to work with him on a project for UPN. I was 23 and just wanted to get my hands dirty. So the execs ave us a set of parameters nd within that we created ome Movies It wasn't my natural choice. I wanted to do weird, fucked up *Monty* Python type stuff. so I knew or my next project I wanted to do something completely different. Usually they want you to stick with a format but luckily our show wasn't

a success so I didn't have to, I could essentially re-invent myself. So with *Metalocalypse*, they're adults, they're not nice to each-other, theres a lot of murder and hellish scenes. Essentially I just fell in love with the guitar again and figured I knew a metal audience and figured they would get it.

#### AU: How long have you been playing guitar?

Brendon: Well I'm 34 now. so over 20 years. I started playing Black Sabbath, "Iron Man" obviously. My friend down the street opened up the whole gate-way of metal oy making me a mix-tape of King Diamond, Slayer, Testament, Death Angel, and Metallica. I was just a kid in suburbia destined to play

AU: Are the characters in Dethklok based on actual musicians, typical stereotypes or maybe people you know?

Brendon: You know I sort of took elements from all of those. The only one really

who is based on an actual musician would be Nathan Explosion. Just the way that George "Corpsegrinder" Fisher of Cannibal Corpse really commands an audience and carries himself is



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very similar, so yeah, George Foreman... errr no wait, although that would be funny - metal songs about the Grill... [much laughter ensues] So yeah, what happened when I pitched the show was that it would be an extreme metal band, and they're gonna be the biggest entertainment act in the world. Kind of opposite Spinal Tap, where a band is on the way out, or you always see shows about bands who have problems getting people to come to shows and real hard luck stories etc. well we went the opposite in that they are the biggest band in the universe! They said YES – get to work! So I started out by writing the theme song, trying to get a grasp of what I wanted the band to be like, I wrote some guitar harmonies, so obviously there would be two guitarists. One would be the fastest guitarist in the world [which he isn't subsequently] but we wanted the joke that the second fastest guitarist in the world was also in the band just to have some kind of ego pull between them. We came up with Sweden VS. Norway and then we gave them all bad-ass

#### AU: So you recruited Gene Hoglan to play drums in your real life incarnation of Dethklok currently on tour. Who else is in the band?

Brendon: Of course Gene also plays on the records too, he just adds so much power and weight to it. I do everything else on the records, play the keyboards, bass, vocals, and guitars. So for the live thing it is Gene and I along with a pal, Mike Kennealy, he played with Frank Zappa, toured with Steve Vai as his right hand guy, matching him lick for lick, harmonizing. He's just a guy who can do impossible things on guitar. And on bass it's Brian Beller, who also graduated from the Berkeley school of music but about four years before I did. When we all got together we just had

#### AU: Tell us about the Dethalbum II. Was it recorded underwater?

Brendon: There's a song called "Murmaider 2: Water Gods". I always kind of liked the idea of doing a rock opera and a song seguel sounded kind of cool. That song takes place right where it left off and the band recorded it underwater Everything just sounds better this time around, this record is a lot faster than the first one. There's a song called the "Cyborg Slayer", and all the songs are a bit longer and a bit more epic.

#### AU: So you mentioned a rock opera, might there be a Broadway musical rendition of

Brendon: I would not be opposed because I'm a sucker for all that absurd niche stuff and I love that embarrassing feeling you get from live musical theater. I like things either really really good, or really really bad.

# AU: What can you tell us about Season 3 of

Brendon: It picks up right where the Season 2 finale left off but with 30 minute episodes this time around. As far as special guests, I have some of my guitar heroes doing it, Steve Vai, Joe Satriani, Slash, the band Enslaved as well as some others I'm not willing to mention at this time.

#### AU: What about the animation process itself?

Brendon: It's all in-house in Hollywood. It's a pretty small team for the most part. The characters are all drawn on paper and we scan those in, and the backgrounds are all generally done on Photoshop by Photoshop wizards. We do a lot of the actual animation frame by frame in Flash and then we'll take everything and run it through Final Cut Pro and After Effects. We've even done some experimenting with 3D models

AU: Do you recommend smoking weed before

Brendon: Haha! Well I guess there's something about these Adult Swim shows and drugs that sort of go hand in hand, so just do what ya gotta do I auess.

#### AU: What would Nathan Explosion say if asked who was the bigger band, Dethklok or

Brendon: Well I think first you'd have to repeat the other band name to him, a few times probably, but I think he would continue to act like he didn't know who the other band was.

### AU: Will you be bringing Dethklok to Canada?

Brendon: Well last year we were there in Montreal as direct support for Iron Maiden and Vancouver is gonna be happy as we're co-headlining a tour with Mastodon in October! We play it up like we sound exactly like Dethklok, and there is a giant theater sized projection screen behind us and we're playing to picture basically. We're back lit so we're just concentrating on sounding as much like Dethklok as possible and not fucking up the

#### AU: I saw a Murderface action figure a while ago, is there going to be a run of figures?

Brendon: Ideally yes, I'd like to get some really cool poses and sculpts the fans would really be into it, but first things first, video game, record,

#### AU: Video game! Is that gonna happen?

Brendon: Yup, the Dethgame is slated for a fall release – it's gonna be downloadable for Xbox 360 and PS3. It's gonna be pretty badass.

# AU: You also have a comic book, Dethklok VS.

Brendon: Yeah, The Goon is a really awesome series by Eric Powell and he approached us and wanted us to do a crossover. Everyone on the show is just a big fan of his so we said absolutely! We think it turned out great, just really funny.

#### AU: Have any of your ideas ever been censored for being too harsh?

Brendon: Well, the network gets concerned sometimes. Everything we've tried to do violence wise has gotten through, it's the sex stuff that doesn't get through. So like if Skwisgaar is having consensual sex with some girl, you can't show pelvic thrusts, nipples or any of that stuff but you know, we can show a baby's head being split open if we wanted to.

#### AU: Who would come out victorious if all the band members were forced to compete in a cage match?

Brendon: Well Nathan would take everybody down, no doubt. I think at first Murderface would probably try and scramble his way out, I think he's the real coward of the group. And you know what, Toki has that berserker rage once in a while so I think it would come down to Toki and Nathan in

# "The Poignant Saga of the Pointed Sticks"

C'mon little ones. Sit down around boompah's slippers, fold your dimpled little fingers and let me tell you of a time long ago when herds of wild punk rockers trod the vast empty spaces of our inner cities. In Vancouver particularly, this breed thrived, bristle-headed, studded of garb and raucous of call. Packs were formed and took names including DOA, the Subhumans and the Rabid. They took up instruments and what they lacked in technique they made up in energy. Their instincts led them to raw and brutal performances. Their bellowings echoed stentorian and dischordant

Yet, in the midst of this melee, there arose within the genus of punk rockers, the species of the Pointed Sticks. What set them apart from the rest of the herd was a sunnier disposition and a less political agenda. The motto was: Pointed Sticks are fun, Singer Nick Jones, a.k.a. Nick O'Teen, warbled lyrics of girls, love and breakups

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alternative to the frenzied barking of OOA's Joe Shithead or Subhuman's Vimpy. The Sticks oaid more attentio o chorus and hook than dreadnought onslaught. They were called power pop. In other esterina hotbeds of punk rockers, this power-pop music was also making headwav. Thus, the Pointed Sticks were called to England by Stiff Records and thus were considered the most

high melodious

successful of Vancouver's hordes.

Unfortunately, after recording an album, Stiff passed on releasing it. The Sticks returned home to Vancouver, toured a bit, played a few gigs, put out the album, Perfect Youth, and simply petered out as band members went on to other musical projects.

In the meantime, life intervened, Jones went on to travel the globe as a merchandise manager for Live Nation Merchandise, Bassist Tony Bardach ioined Los Popularos and took up acting and art. Guitarist Bill Napier-Hemy became a music teacher at the Fraser Academy in Kitsilano and married Jade Blade of the Dishrags. Keyboardist Gord Nicholl opened up a recording studio, Paramount Recorders, in Vancouver's Japantowr lan Tiles, a.k.a. Buddy Selfish of Buddy Selfish and his Saviors, went became the office manager at Radical Gaming, a Vancouver-based video-game company. And life went on anon. Producing children rather than music became a priority. While touring with DOA, Joe Shithead, honcho grande of Sudden Death records, noticed

that wherever DOA toured fans asked about the halcyon days of Vancouver punk. He negotiated the rights to albums by Pointed Sticks, Modernettes and Art Bergmann's Young Canadians and noted that they sold well, especially in Japan. Unexpectedly, a call came from Sudden Death's distributor in Japan with a request for the Pointed Sticks to play three gigs as they had sold over 3,000 records there.

Maneuvering jobs and children, the band managed some rehearsals and hopped the plane in August 2006. They played Kyoto on Friday night and Tokyo on Saturday and Sunday night. The sold-out crowds of 300 were ga-ga - as can be seen on the YouTube coverage. "They knew the words better than we did," says Bardach, "We had to stay two hours after the gig to meet people who had spent time rehearsing their English to

Jones adds, "All these 30-year-olds had street posters from Vancouver from 1978."

Understandably blown away, the band came home and would play together as time allowed, culminating in two sold-out shows at Richards in January 2007. Suddenly a hot commodity again, the band was invited to headline the First Annual New York Power Pop Festival in April 2007. A year later, the Sticks regrouped for a benefit for injured producer/engineer Scott Harding.

"We all have careers and things that are more important than the band," says Bardach, "The band came entirely secondary, which simplified things. Making an album was just a natural occurrence of being in a band and getting on together."

"The album took a year and a half from start to finish," says Jones. Calling in favours, they recorded at Nicholl's studio and had Mike Fraser (Aerosmith, AC/DC, Franz Ferdinand) mix the album for a case of Old Style.

Thus my young ones, 29 years after Perfect Youth. we have a new Pointed Sticks album, Three Lefts Make a Right -released on November 1 on vinyl, CD and download through the Northern Electric label (northern-electric.ca). Ever seen a vinyl record, Billy? Here, let boompah put it on this

rotating thing and drop the needle on it. Ah, nov isten to what used to set boompah to pogoing at the Smilin' Buddha Cabaret lo those many

years ago. Yes, Pointed Sticks the only band to meld the polar opposite influences of ABBA and the Stooges. Remarkably, the whole album sounds young, fun and still obsessed with teen pop and girls. Tiles has a great powerful drum sound and Bardach's bass alternately bounces and drives. Napier-Hemy still strums at Buzzcocks speed ("Anytime") with little Blue Oyster Cult/ Stooges-style runs tastefully tossed in ("Too Late, Wireless"). Nicholl's keyboards are stellar here, underpinning heavy raga stylings ("Leave Me Alone") to lush Deep Purple-ish backdrop arrangements to carnival calliope sounds ("Anytime"). And Jones's voice, a high reedy thing unlike any other in pop music, hasn't aged any except perhaps to show some lower range on the John Lennon-ish "How I Felt". Highlights include the Bardach-penned "Igor Said", which features the Dishrags on backing vocals and terrific lyrics about circumnavigating the bouncer at the Smilin Buddha, back in the day. "Scrambled Eggs" is another killer and should garner the radio play

"I think the Pointed Sticks left a lot on the table when we packed it in," says Jones. "We wanted to make a real Pointed Sticks record and, without being nostalgic, it certainly is referential [to the punk days]. There's a power-pop renaissance going on and we're kind of godfathers to a lot of 30-and-under bands that are playing that kind of music." Then he laughs, "And, we've been together longer now than we were in the first place." (Pointed Sticks play two shows at Vancouver's Rio

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# "Thunder God of Rock" Interview w/ John Michael Thor

#### AU: What are you most famous for?

Thor: The name is Thor, AKA John Michael Thor, And you might say I've been in the rock business as a performer, for five decades of rock! That's what my new album is called: Sign of the V

#### AU: Explain the birth of Thor

Thor: In the late 60s I started to get into bands like Iron Butterfly. Then Zeppelin came along, and my music got heavier. Then I became more theatrical, because in the early 70s there was the glitte rock scene. Ziggy Stardust, Alice Cooper... I thought if those guys can do their shtick, I'm going to do mine. And I became The Rock n' Roll Gladiator, and it developed from there to being The Rock Viking, I call it Rock Theatre.

#### AU: Did you dub that term?

Thor: I would say I'm one of the predecessors of modern rock theatre. Recently I just played the Sweden Rock Festival, in Salzburg Sweden, and the Sauna Open Air Festival in Finland. And there were a lot of metal bands that were very similar, and they told me they

were inspired by my albums. And that's how they got their concept. It reminded me of the early 80s metal scene, and I was very enthralled by that.

#### AU: Were there similar bands at the time?

Thor: I always felt that I was a total original, I was the guy who started Gladiator Rock, if you want to call it Barbarian Rock, Super Hero Rock, no one did it back then. Keep The Doas Away came out. it was before Much Music, before MTV, and we filmed probably the first concept video ever in Canada and it was shot on 35MM.



Thor: Yeah, I started body building at seven years old, so I started very young. I started entering competition at 13 years old. I won titles like Mr. lr. Canada, then Mr. Canada. I competed against Louie Ferrigno twice, almost beat him in Mr. Iniverse, and I was also on stage with Mike Catt, Ken Waller, Arnold Schwarzenegger. I retired at 19 to go full time into the music business.

# AU: Tell us about your appearance The Merv

Thor: I was touring A LOT at that time. I actually played 300 days out of the year, this is back in 1976. So I had the opportunity of going on *The* Merv Griffin Show. It gave me national fame very quickly, and shortly after that I signed a major record deal with RCA, and started doing movies.

#### AU: Tell us what goes into a live Thor show and the feats of strength you perform.

Thor: I've had numerous feats of strength, tonight 'm going to bend a steel bar in my teeth AU: Did you used to blow up and explode hot water bottles with your lungs?

Thor: It's very very dangerous, and I've destroyed many brain cells. I didn't want to destroy any more so I can write my book. I probably have blown up maybe 3286 hot water bottles in my lifetime.

#### AU: With the Viking thing, would you say you inspired Manowar?

Thor: Let me tell you about Manowar. Ross (the) Boss was in a punk group called The Dictators years ago. Those guys weren't even out of diapers



Thor: I'm a proud Canadian, and I feel that I carry the Canadian flag proud and high. I am a true Canadian, and I am proud of it.





# **MAN ON FIRE**

# "Oxygen Mask Not included"

**Stuntman Colin Decker Attempts** 

By Liam Lux Ever light your farts on fire? You probably think you're pretty cool. Or cover your hand with hairspray before sparking a bic? Neat trick for a beginner. Ever literally turn yourself into a living breathing, walking fireball? Didn't think

Colin Decker has. He does it all the time. As a career stuntman and one half of Fire 4 Hire, a company specializing in film pyrotechnics, he's done cooler things than you can imagine. So cool, in fact, that there's even a kick-ass band

named after him: The Colin Decker Freefall. But it's all in a day's work for Decker: "This is what I do on a daily basis. This is my job – setting people on fire, being

Decker and his Fire 4 Hire business partner Dustin Brooks have set fire to all kinds of things. They've burned Jet Li, the Undertaker, the Incredible Hulk, Watchmen, and X-Men, just to name a few. But adrenaline junkies like these guys rarely rest on their laurels. There's always a way to go bigger and better. Like going for the Guinness Book of World Records, which is exactly what they did on a windy overcast weekend last month. Using a fire-retardant gel of their own invention, they planned to take the title for setting a live human being on fire – and letting him burn - for longer than anyone ever before. To them, it's kind of a no-brainer. "Our business is setting people on fire, so why not have the world record?

The gel itself is a secret recipe, a special blend that they never bothered to patent since that requires divulging the ingredients. According to Brooks, the potion is unique in that a stuntman can burn longer and more safely than ever before. And more realistically. "With our product, we're able to


set flesh on fire, which is totally different," says Brooks, Decker adds, "it's non-toxic, hypoallergenic, foodsafe... if you wanted to eat it you could, but why on Earth would you?" According to Guinness, the existing record is wo minutes, 38 seconds, which may not seem long, but take the official criteria into account: he entire body must be engulfed, with flames ing at least two feet in the air; no more than nree layers of clothing can be used; and no preathing assistance apparatus is allowed. You try walking around as a human inferno for that ong, with temperatures reaching 800 degrees. Despite their determination, nature had some


tricks to play that day. In front of a gaggle of media, the Burnaby Fire Department, friends and family, Decker covered himself in the gel and began to put on the layers... just as the wind picked up. By the time he was ready then vere intermittent gusts coming from random directions. Wind is good for fire – but bad for whatever's on fire. The boys went for it anyway Surrounded by a safety crew, Colin managed

to walk around the parking lot of M&M Studio Services with relative calm as the gusts turned n into a raging ball of fire. But the wind kept shifting on him, feeding him a faceful of flame. After a full minute-and-a-half at the brink of disaster, the mission had to be aborted.

As Decker dove into a waiting kiddle pool, his helpers blasting him with fire extinguishers, Brooks explained what happened: "We had our normal Vancouver weather. It didn't help us in the least. We went forward with it just to try anyway. We thought we had a single wind direction and we could work within that. It wasn't – it was very unpredictable. At one point the fire was very uncontrollable.

Although disappointed, Decker kept his cool, "I didn't get the world record today but at least I get to live to try another day. That's the biggest and most important thing. We'll regroup and we'll try again and hopefully the weather will be a bit more cooperative. wish I could go longer."


"I didn't think it would be that vulgar," a suited up man apologetically said to his date in the liquor lineup at intermission - HELLO, this is the Evil



# **Jesus Christ Vampire Hunter**

#### **Interview w/ Lee Demarbre**

#### AU: Who are we talking to?

Lee: Lee Gordon Demarbre, director, editor and cinematographer of Jesus Christ Vampire Hunter. I'm also doing the upcoming Smash Cut with David Hess, Michael Barriman, Herschell Gordon Lewis, Sasha Grey, and Ray

# AU: Is H.G. Lewis really in

Lee: Yes, Herschell Gordon Lewis is in Smash Cut. He introduces the movie. Smash Cut is a tribute to the films and the art of Herschell Gordon Lewis.

# AU: Is it better than your

Lee: I think on the surface it is a more accomplished film, you know, most of it's in focus, sound's good, it looks like a real movie should. Where as Jesus

Christ Vampire Hunter has shortcomings that are sort of... charming? Smash Cut is something I've been dreaming about doing for years. I would say my most personal films are Jesus Christ Vampire Hunter and Smash Cut.

#### AU: Where did the original idea for the Jesus Christ Vampire Hunter come from?

Lee: I was doing a few short films with my writer Ian Driscoll called the Hairy Knuckles Series and we were going back and forth from Toronto editing the film. Ian was in the car with me and we were listening to Michael Jackson's Thriller album and somehow listening to Thriller, the four words came out of my mouth in succession "Jesus Christ Vampire Hunter". I though, wow, that

sounds like a great movie. Really the title came first, then we brainstormed plot ideas and we asked Phil Caracas if he'd be interested in playing Jesus Christ, he also plays Hairy Knuckles by the way, and he was in Smash Cut. He really loved the idea and we were shooting shortly after that. We started shooting in May, 1999. Released the film in the fall 0f 2001. So, its been a long time. Its been almost eight years.

#### AU: What was the budget?

Lee: About I'd say \$40,000. My wife says about \$45.000. On screen about the most money we spend was \$200 on the Jesus Christ Vampire

Hunter wig, to make him look like esus. But all in all the biggest expense went to finishing the movie on film, getting a negative cut and inishing the film. Everyone worked or free, we shot on the weekends. That's why it took so long to shoot and it was a real labour of love.

#### AU: Would you say that it was a **Cult Hit?**

Lee: Yeah, the title went a long way vith that movie. It was like boobies on a poster or a car crash. People ere sort of instantly attracted to it by the title alone. There's fans, here's people who don't like it. here's people who like it. So it does certainly have a life of its own. They just released on Blue Ray. So,

if you're interested in seeing 16mm graininess blown up to high definition get Jesus Christ Vampire Hunter on Blue Ray., which is one of the most least expensive Blue Rays available.

#### AU: And what is the distribution company?

Lee: Music Video Distribution owns a company called Eclectic DVDs. Eclectic DVDs released it in America, I released it own my own in Canada.

#### AU: Wasn't there a talking sandwich or something in the movie?

Lee: Yes, there's a talking ice cream. (laughs) Jesus Christ's father, God, appears to Jesus in the form of a cherries Jubilee ice cream. Everyone

everyone looses it in the theatre. It's fun to see it with a bunch of people. I don't recommend watching this movie alone. Invite your friends over, buy a case of beer, and watch it. It's just a film that plays good in audience more than to

#### AU: Will there be a sequel to Jesus Christ Vampire Hunter?

Lee: We've got a prequel idea and two sequel ideas One called Jesus Christ Vampire Hunter 2: Roman Holiday, where the vampires go back in a time machine to kill the first coming of Jesus. So, Jesus, the second coming, then has to travel in back and save himself from the vampires. So, there are two Jesus' in it. That's the sequel. The prequel's set in the Vietnam War, like Rambo with Jesus Christ. The alternate idea is called *Jesus* Christ Vampire 2: King of the Kickboxers. Where it's so of like The Game of Death with Bruce Lee. My idea is instead of keeping the idea that Jesus kills only vampires is to switch to other genres.

#### AU: What do you think of my concept, The Passion of Zombie Jesus?

Lee: I think it's great! A lot of people told me he should have been a zombie. A lot of people mention that idea, so you beat me to it. (Laughs.) I guess it might have been an idea at some point. We would have done the zombie one eventually but now we cant do it. So, thank you very much!

# AU: Maybe Zombie Jesus could fight Jesus

Lee: Maybe that's the prequel. Maybe when Jesus goes back in time, he discovers the first coming of Jesus is a Zombie Jesus

#### AU: It's a mind numbing concept. Any final words for aspiring filmmakers?

Lee: Yeah, I'd say keep the filmmaking experience a learning experience. You gotta be able to keep a high level of excitement until the very end of post production and to release. Until the movie's on DVD or Blue Ray, you have to keep that same level of excitement. Look at Troma's Lloyd Kaufman, he's a big inspiration in terms of pushing your movies. He goes to the Cannes Film Festival and gets as much attention as any other



Enough talk, and time for action.

#### AU: Where do you get the money to make your novies? Investors

Lee: Sometimes you have to spend your own money to be able to get your first film made. I think in Canada, we rely on government grants too much, and when you don't get the grant, you just give up on the project. I love American independent filmmakers because they spend their own money, they'll use their mom's credit cards. But when making a movie, don't be afraid to spend your own money to make it. I feel like we're on this precipice where filmmakers have to take over the industry again. Soon you're not gonna need a big budget to make your dreams a celluloid reality.



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



#### AU: What's the art scene like there?

Kowalchuk: In Chestermere it's non-existent. In Calgary though it's pretty rockin'! Obviously being a community full of want-to-be-cowboys you wouldn't really expect too much, but being immersed in the art scene here you quickly start to see how hard everyone

# AU: How would you describe the art you

Kowalchuk: I consider myself a practitioner and founder of Retrology. My work would probably better suit 1960s advertising, but I'm stuck in 2009 waiting for Doc Brown to outfit his Delorian with a flux capacitor and send me back in time.

# AU: What are some of the major influences on your artistic style?

Kowalchuk: Obviously there are a lot of comic book influences: Chester Gould, Charles Schulz, Dick Sprang, Charles Addams,



Alex Toth, The Hernandez Brothers,
David Mazzucchelli, Mike Allred.
But I'm also very influenced by old
television programs. The Adam West
Batman TV series is arguably the
biggest influence on my work.

# AU: Tell me about your idea for this issue's cover and how it was created?

Kowalchuk: This was a huge issue, not only is it special being number 30, but it has four big-time metal bands featured! I love drawing big colourful characters, so I took the opportunity on this project to draw all the members of all the bands. It was a huge undertaking, not only did I have to get everyone's likenesses right, but I somehow had to find room for all of them on the cover. It was a blast, I hope readers enjoy it.

#### AU: Does most of your work tend to lean to the side of Good or Evil?

Kowalchuk: Totally evil! I was that kid that always cheered for the villain.

# AU: If you weren't an artist, what would you want to




#### AU: Upcoming projects?

have a new show of work for the first Thursday of every month. Most of this work can be viewed on my website.


